

The National Psoriasis Foundation conducts survey panels twice each year to understand the experiences and opinions of people with psoriasis and psoriatic arthritis. These surveys help the Psoriasis Foundation gain awareness and document the impact of these diseases. This information is used to shape programs that meet the needs of the psoriasis community and to determine the need for additional research. Highlights from the Fall 2005 Survey Panel are below.

Respondent demographics

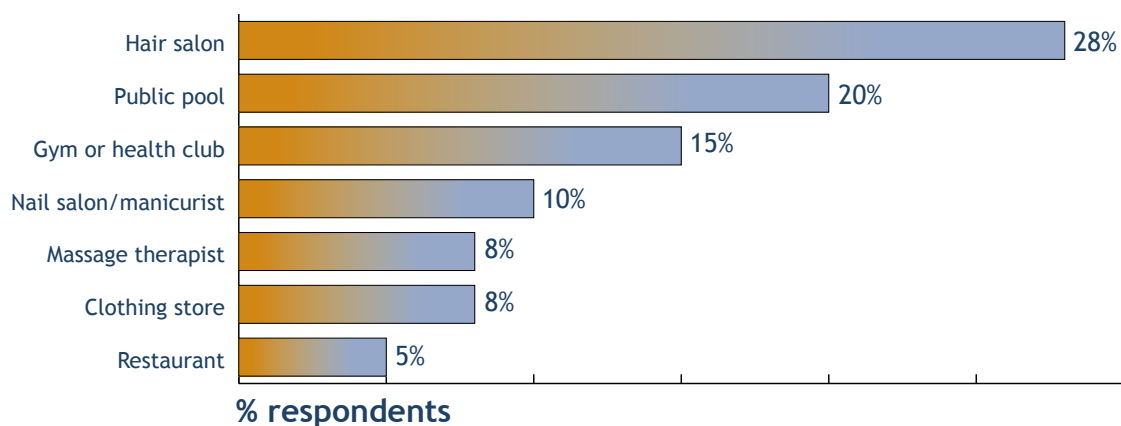
- Nearly two-thirds of respondents (63%) have been diagnosed with psoriasis, while one-third of respondents (33%) have been diagnosed with both psoriasis and psoriatic arthritis
- More than one-quarter (29%) of respondents without a psoriatic arthritis diagnosis have joint pain or stiffness lasting more than three months

Impact on daily life

- Nearly one-quarter of respondents (21%) report their disease has had a negative affect on their job in the past month
- More than one-third of respondents (36%) report that treating their disease places a financial burden on their family
- Nearly one-half of respondents (43%) report problems sleeping in the past month due to their disease
- More than one-quarter of respondents (26%) report their disease interfered with their sexual activities in the past month
- Approximately one-third of respondents report problems using their hands (34%) and walking (33%) in the past month due to their disease
- Nearly one-third of respondents report problems sitting (34%) and standing (32%) for long periods of time in the past month due to their disease

- Many respondents have reported problems receiving service due to their disease

Quality of life

- Approximately one-third of respondents report strong feelings of anger and frustration (36%), self-consciousness (32%), helplessness (31%) and embarrassment (30%) with their psoriasis (Koo-Menter Psoriasis Instrument, PQOL-12)
- More than one-third (36%) of respondents report itching to be a large problem with their disease
- Many respondents with psoriasis and psoriatic arthritis consider their disease to be a large problem in everyday life

Moderate problem (4-7)	46%	39%
Small problem (1-3)	29%	20%

Respondents were asked to rate the problem of their disease in everyday life from 1 to 10, where 1 means no problem at all and 10 means a very large problem.

Doctor care and treatment satisfaction

- More than two-thirds of respondents (72%) saw one to two different doctors in the past two years for their disease
- Nearly three-quarters of respondents (70%) see a dermatologist compared to a general practitioner (17%) or rheumatologist (15%)
- Nearly one-fifth of respondents (14%) are not in treatment either because they have given up (31%) or because of the cost of treatment (46%)
- More than one-quarter of respondents with psoriasis (29%) and psoriatic arthritis (36%) are very satisfied with their treatment

Methodology

Interviews were conducted with individuals with psoriasis and psoriatic arthritis by phone (n=200) and online (n=228) from Nov. 8 – Dec. 7, 2005. Respondents were screened for a balance of gender and age, and two-thirds (66%) of respondents had moderate to severe psoriasis.
