

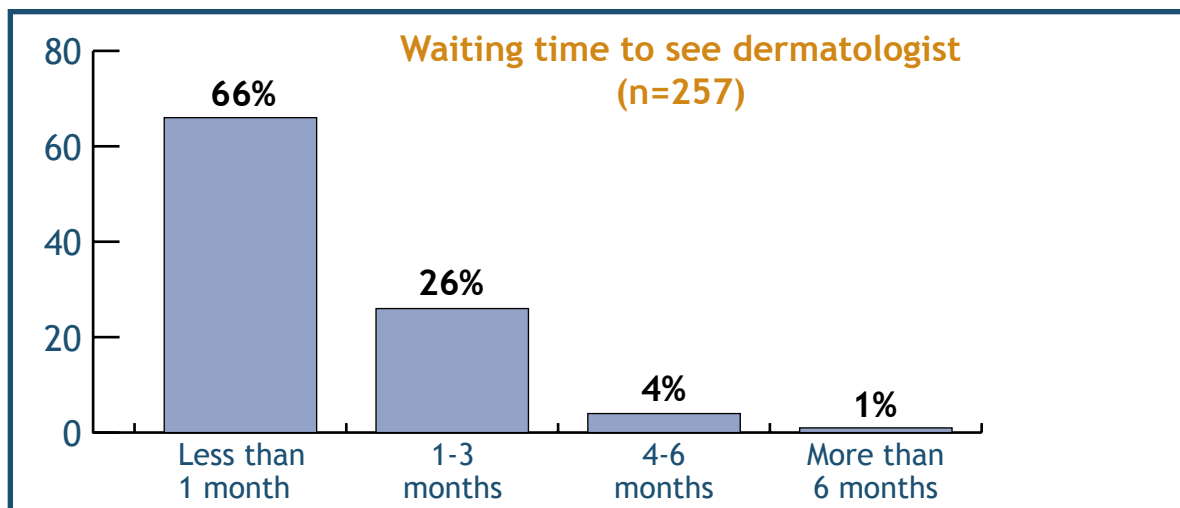
The National Psoriasis Foundation conducts survey panels twice each year to understand the experiences and opinions of people with psoriasis and psoriatic arthritis. These surveys help the Psoriasis Foundation gain awareness and document the impact of these diseases. This information is used to shape programs that meet the needs of the psoriasis community and to determine the need for additional research. Highlights from the Spring 2007 Survey Panel are below.

Respondent demographics

- More than one-half of respondents (58%) have been diagnosed with psoriasis, while more than one-third of respondents (41%) have been diagnosed with both psoriasis and psoriatic arthritis.
- Nearly one-third of respondents (31%) without a psoriatic arthritis diagnosis have joint pain or stiffness lasting more than three months.

Doctor care and treatment satisfaction

- More than two-thirds of respondents (68%) saw one to two different doctors in the past two years for their disease.
- Two-thirds of respondents (66%) see a dermatologist compared to a general practitioner (20%) or rheumatologist (25%).
- One-tenth of respondents (10%) are not in treatment either because they have given up or because of the cost of treatment.
- More than one-quarter of respondents with psoriasis (29%) and psoriatic arthritis (36%) are very satisfied with their treatment.
- Nearly one-half of respondents (48%) see their dermatologist four or more times per year, and more than one-quarter (29%) see their dermatologist two to three times per year.
- Two-thirds of respondents (66%) see their dermatologist within one month of calling for an appointment.





Quality of life

- More than one-third of respondents report strong feelings of anger and frustration (44%), helplessness (42%) and self-consciousness (40%) with their psoriasis (Koo-Menter Psoriasis Instrument, PQOL-12).
- More than one-third of respondents (41%) report itching to be a large problem in their lives.
- More than one-third of respondents (40%) report they choose their clothing to conceal their psoriasis.
- Many respondents with psoriasis and psoriatic arthritis consider their disease to be a large problem in everyday life.

Small problem (1-3)	19%	12%

Respondents were asked to rate the problem of their disease in everyday life from 1 to 10, where 1 means no problem at all and 10 means a very large problem.

Methodology

Interviews were conducted with individuals with psoriasis and psoriatic arthritis by phone (n=201) and online (n=202) from May 5 – May 23, 2007. Respondents were screened for a balance of gender, and more than two-thirds of respondents (70%) had moderate to severe psoriasis.
